The NSA not only spied on the leaders of <u>Germany</u>, <u>Brazil</u> and <u>Mexico</u>, but on at least <u>35</u> world leaders.

The Guardian reports:

One unnamed US official handed over 200 numbers, including those of the **35** world leaders, none of whom is named. These were **immediately "tasked"** for monitoring by the NSA.

That's just one incident we know about. The NSA also spies on the <u>European Union</u>, the <u>European Parliament</u>, the <u>G20 summit</u> and other allies.

The NSA <u>asked</u> government agencies to share their Rolodexes, so the NSA would have phone numbers for top foreign political and military leaders.

A confidential government memo <u>admits</u> that the spying didn't help prevent terrorism:

The memo acknowledges that eavesdropping on the numbers had produced "little reportable intelligence".

Because the leaders of allies such as Germany, Brazil, Mexico, the EU and G-20 have no ties to Al Qaeda terrorists, the spying was obviously done for *other* purposes.

The NSA conducts <u>widespread industrial espionage</u> on our allies. That has nothing to do with terrorism, either.

Indeed, there is <u>no evidence that mass surveillance has prevented a **single** terrorist attack</u>. On the contrary, top counter-terror experts say that mass spying <u>actually **hurts** U.S. counter-terror efforts(more here and here)</u>.

If NSA spying were really focused on terrorism, our allies and companies <u>wouldn't be</u> <u>fighting back so hard</u> against it.

And even the argument that 9/11 changed everything holds no water. Spying started <u>before 9/11</u> ... and <u>various excuses have been used to spy on Americans over the years</u>. Even NSA's industrial espionage has been going on for <u>many decades</u>. And the NSA was already spying on American Senators more than <u>40 years ago</u>.

Governments who spy on their own population <u>always</u> do it to <u>crush dissent</u>. (Why do you think that the NSA is doing <u>exactly</u> the same thing which <u>King George did to the American colonists</u> ... which led to the <u>Revolutionary War?</u>)

Of course, if even *half* of what a NSA whistleblower Russel Tice says – that <u>the NSA is spying</u> on – and <u>blackmailing</u> – top <u>American</u> government officials and military officers (and <u>see this</u>) – then things are really out of whack.
