

# Trump Warns There is a Chance of "A Major, Major Conflict" with North Korea

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While emoting sympathy for **Kim Jong Un**'s situation, **President Trump** told <u>Reuters</u>, during a lengthy interview ahead of his 100th day in office, that he'd "love to solve things diplomatically," but warned that "there is a chance that we could end up having a major, major conflict with North Korea."

Putting a somewhat human face on the North Korean leader, President Trump had an interesting response when asked by <u>Reuters</u> if he considered North Korean leader Kim Jong Un to be rational...

"He's 27 years old. His father dies, took over a regime. So say what you want but that is not easy, especially at that age.

"I'm not giving him credit or not giving him credit, I'm just saying that's a very hard thing to do. As to whether or not he's rational, I have no opinion on it. I hope he's rational."

And that is perhaps why he still holds out hope for a path that avoids the military option...

"We'd love to solve things diplomatically but it's very difficult,"

Emphasizing the possibility of new sanctions, and in particular leverage from China:

"I have established a very good personal relationship with President Xi"

**"I believe he is trying very hard.** He certainly doesn't want to see turmoil and death. He doesn't want to see it. He is a good man. He is a very good man and I got to know him very well."

Still, <u>as Reuters notes</u>, just a day after he and his top national security advisers briefed U.S. lawmakers declaring North Korea "an urgent national security threat and top foreign policy priority;" and one day before **Secretary of State Rex Tillerson** will press the United Nations Security Council on sanctions to further isolate Pyongyang over its nuclear and missile programs, it's clear where this could lead...
